

## Discussion/Reflection Questions

1. Think about how you read the Bible. What is your “hermeneutic?” Do you see the Bible as progressive or static; flat or hierarchical? Think about how the way you read and interpret the Bible impacts what you believe the Bible says and means to you.

4. To whom or what should Christians pledge allegiance? On what biblical basis should we answer this question?
5. Will you commit to pray for our congregation as we undertake this study together? Pray that we will all have hearts and minds that are open to learn (and follow-through on) appropriate ways to be the followers of Jesus who live in the current realities (political and other) of our world.

Genesis 1:26-31 (church Bible page 1)

(26) Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

(27) So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

(28) God blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it. Rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air and over every living creature that moves on the ground."

(29) Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food. (30) And to all the beasts of the earth and all the birds of the air and all the creatures that move on the ground—everything that has the breath of life in it—I give every green plant for food." And it was so.

(31) God saw all that he had made, and it was very good. And there was evening, and there was morning—the sixth day.
